NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR

This has been an extremely busy year at the Recreation Resource Centre. The Centre staff have attended numerous national and international conferences, served on a wide variety of provincial and national committees, and coordinated a number of professional development initiatives for those involved in the delivery of recreation services throughout the province.

The research services program of the Centre has been expanded this year with the addition of a full time Research Coordinator position. During the past twelve months, the Centre has been involved in over thirty projects with a wide variety of government and non-profit agencies.

The Spring Symposium held at Oak Island in May brought together over 30 recreation professionals representing over 500 years of experiences in the field. During a three day period, the group developed a vision for recreation in the province for the year 2000. Since that time, a task committee has been analysing the data and will have the results available early in the New Year.

The Management Board and staff of the Centre are currently in the process of developing plans for the construction of a new facility to house the Centre, which will vastly improve access to the collection by clients. This new facility has been a dream of the staff for many years, and it's exciting to finally be moving towards this goal.

Another exciting development that has been in the works for six years is the development of a data base for the Centre's collection. The final programming is currently being completed and the data base should be available for internal use in January. The present plans call for the data base to be accessible by external users by the Spring, at which time the Centre will be providing regional workshops for users wishing to access the data base from personal computers. Once an on-line networking system is developed. plans are then to develop a number of mini data bases that will be accessible throughout the system.

During the past year, the Centre staff has enjoyed serving established clients, and has welcomed many new users. We hope to continue to serve your needs in the New Year.

VISION 2000 - An Update

For those who are unaware of the UISION 2000 project - a brief history:

In May of 1988, at its annual Spring Symposium, the Recreation Resource Centre brought together 33 representatives of recreation in the province for 3 days at the Oak Island Inn on Nova Scotia's South Shore. The task of that group was to examine the past and present state of the recreation field in Nova Scotia and to construct a "blueprint" for the future of recreation in Nova Scotia to the year 2000.

The group worked successfully in six subgroups, and, after much analysis and discussion, came up with a great deal of information which would form the framework for a comprehensive vision to the year 2000, hence the title "VISION 2000".

At the end of the symposium, a commitment was made by the Centre to move toward the realization of the Vision. A committee consisting of Brenda Robertson, Lyle Davis, the sub-group facilitators and Sport and Recreation Commission members was formed to oversee these next steps in the process. The committee reviewed the information generated at the Symposium, extracted themes which were common to a number of the sub-groups, incorporated the themes into a global vision consisting of 11 components, and extracted stratecoip for each component of the global uision.

The results of this work were distributed to the original group of 33 for their review and input. Revisions were made and a presentation of the work was given by Brenda and Lyle at the 1988 R.R.N.S. Conference in Truro on November 3,1988.

Since that time, the Centre staff have undertaken a re-examination of the component strategies to ascertain whether there are additional ones which might be identified in helping to achieve the component. Once this task is completed, presentations of the "Vision" document will be made to the Boards of Directors

of the following organizations: R.R.N.S., R.C.D.N.S., Sport Nova Scotia, Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities, and to representatives of the N.S. Sport and Recreation Commission, Dalhousie and Acadia Universities. Each of these groups will be asked to join a coalition by naming a representative to meet with reps from the other groups. The purpose of the coalition will be to meet periodically to share the initiatives being taken relating to the components of the Vision and to identify opportunities for cooperative endeavours.

This is an exciting process, and one which will hopefully make significant positive impact on the field over the next decade.

UPCOMING PRESENTATION

Lyle Davis, Coordinator of Research at the Recreation Resource Centre has been invited to deliver a 3-hour presentation on Recreation Marketing at the N.R.P.A. National Forum on Marketing in May at Saratoga Springs, New York. The session will focus on the model and process of marketing developed in the Rec Check manual currently distributed by the Recreation Resource Centre. The Rec Check is being used as a text in the recreation degree programs at both Acadia University and the University of Alberta, and has sold over 1500 copies to recreation professionals in Canada and the United States.

ANNUAL SPRING SYMPOSIUM

Last year, the annual spring symposium focussed upon the development of a vision for recreation in the province of Nova Scotia for the year 2000. The number one component of the vision was that accessible opportunities would be provided for all Hova Scotians to engage in meaningful forms of recreation. He know today that this is not the case. Throughout the province daily Nova Scotians are denied access to opportunities by virtue of their ethnic background, religious bellef, gender, mental or physical ability, or any number of other similar characteristics. Many times the providers of recreation services aren't aware that the nature of a program may exclude certain types of people. The symposium will focus on educating recreation providers about the inherent barriers to participation that for specific segments of the population, and about actions which can be taken to ensure that opportunities will, indeed, exist for all.

THIS YEAR'S SPRING SYMPOSIUM: MAY 1 - 3, 1989 AT THE OAK ISLAND INN.

This year, the Spring Symposium will run back-to-back with the 1989 R.S.A.C. Conference, (which is to be May 3-5, Oak island inn) This will happen for a number of reasons:

- a) The topic of the Spring Symposium is an issue for the recreation professional to address as part of the professions responsibility to society. The R.S.A.C. Conference plans to deal both with the recreation professional and his/her role in the profession. The relevance of one event to the other made the connection of the two meetings reasonable.
- b) Both events are normally held in the late spring. By combining the two events, these two important professional development opportunities can be capitalized upon with much less disruption of work and cost to the recreation practitioner.

c) The Recreation Resource Centre will be co-ordinating the full program day of the R.S.A.C. Conference (Thursday), which will deal with the personal side of the professional development of the recreation practitioner.

 draw out the information needed to
 identify interests, needs or desires

- the ability to review and summarize; to confirm that every exchange is mutually understood
- the ability to search for and screen facts
